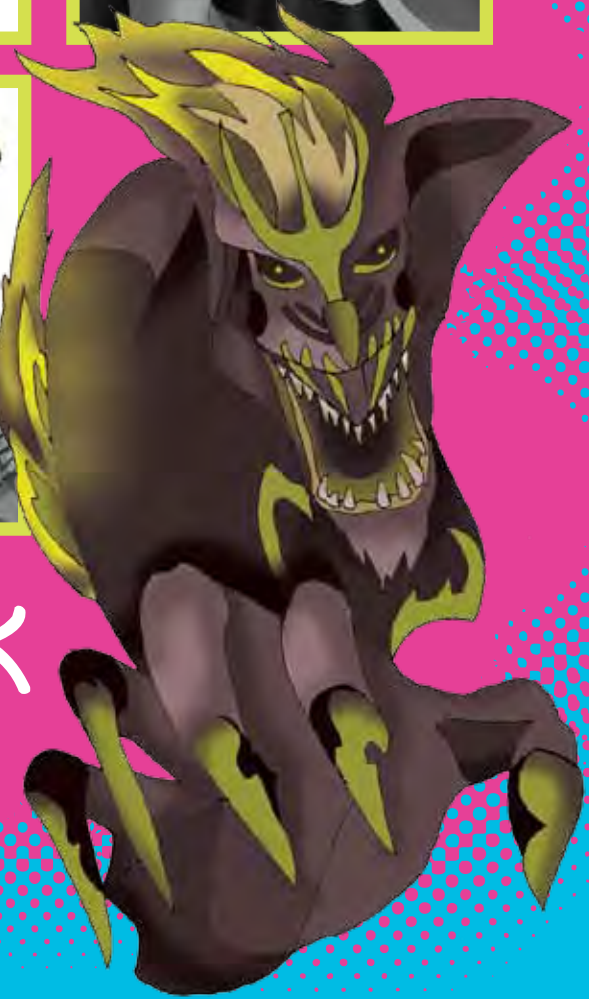

The cost is at least £40 million to our society per week.

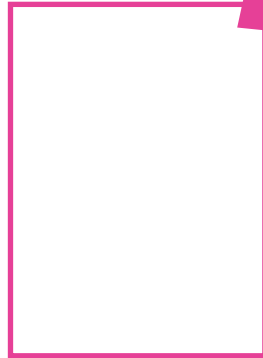
As there are 52 weeks in one year, that is a cost of $52 \times £40$ million. A total of £2,080,000,000!!

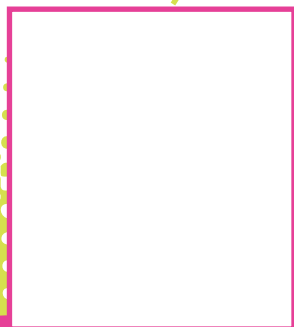
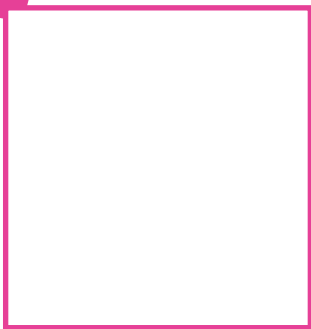
COSTS and CONSEQUENCES of Arson to Society

SMOKE ALARM WAKES FAMILY

DAD AND KIDS FLEE ARSON TERROR

A father and three children were rescued from their blazing Leicester home today after arsonists pushed burning paper through a letterbox.

The sleeping four were saved after a smoke alarm woke them up at 4am at their home in Sandcroft Close, New Parks.

Stuart Parker, 42, and his daughters Chloe, 9, Ellie, 4 and son Tom, 11, were all in the same bedroom when the alarm went off.

Mr Parker looked out of the door to see flames in the hall and thick smoke rising up the stairs. He slammed the bedroom door shut and called the fire service, who advised him to stay in the bedroom and seal off the room as best he could with quilts at the bottom of the door.

As he waited, Mr Parker banged desperately on the wall to try and attract the attention of his parents, Ted and Dorothy Parker, who lived next door.

Ted Parker, aged 76, said "We knew nothing until we heard the fireman smashing down the door to reach Stuart and the children. Stuart managed to carry Ellie downstairs, and the fireman helped the two older children get out. They were badly shaken. We thought Stuart was alright, but he collapsed about an hour later and had to be rushed to the Leicester Royal Infirmary.

Mr Parker said he had no idea who was responsible, adding that he had lived there three years without problems.

He said "I didn't want to go to hospital but I just passed out when the policeman was interviewing me". Fire investigators and Police CID officers were at the scene this morning.

A fire official said today, "We could have been dealing with multiple fatalities on this case - without the smoke alarm it is unlikely that the family would have woken up".

Investigations suggest that lighted paper was pushed through the letterbox. That then set fire to strips of old wallpaper and a dustsheet that had been left in the hall whilst Mr Parker was redecorating.

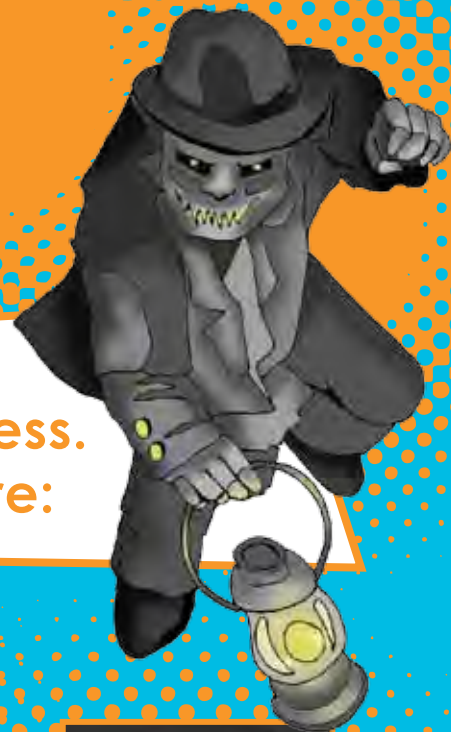
HOAX CALLS

Making a hoax call to the emergency services is a criminal offence and all hoax calls can be traced.

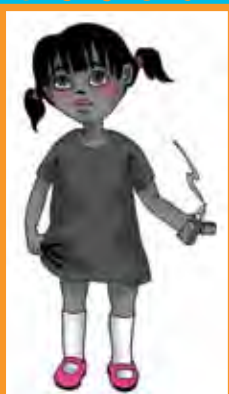
Produce a poster, targeted at children, to put in telephone kiosks. The poster must clearly explain the dangers of making a hoax call and would stop them from doing so.



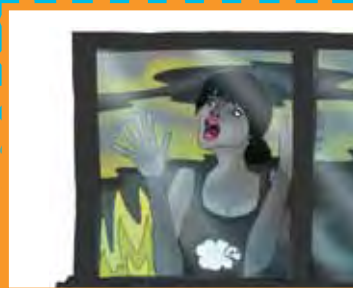
THINK!!!



Most accidents are due to carelessness. Here's an example of a bad house fire:



Lighter left where young child can play with it



Windows locked and no-one can find the keys



No battery in the smoke alarm

A family is trapped in a fire in their home



A young child scared and hides in the wardrobe



A man falls asleep whilst smoking

A working smoke alarm will give the family warning of the fire and more time to get out.

Did you know?

- Last year LFRS attended at least two serious road traffic collisions every day.

- Over half of all road accidents involving children happen during the hour before or after school.

1 RACIST ARSON ATTACK ON LEICESTER MOSQUE

A fire started deliberately in a mosque in the centre of Leicester caused £80,000 of damage. Locks on the main doors of the mosque were broken and the intruders used petrol to set fire to the entrance hall.

Firefighters wearing breathing apparatus battled for more than 3 hours to bring the blaze under control. One firefighter was seriously injured when part of the ceiling collapsed on him; his condition today is described as 'critical'.

A community leader for the mosque said "Sadly, our prayers are often interrupted by a group of men who run in and chant racist remarks. Last week one of them threatened to start a fire. The mosque is a place of prayer and peace. The whole community is upset by the fire".

3 SACKED SHOP WORKER TAKES REVENGE

A 29 year old woman was today starting a six year prison sentence for the crime of arson.

Sarah Williams had been sacked from Kwik-Save earlier this year for stealing money. In court, Miss Williams admitted to setting fire to the store because she was angry with her supervisor and wanted to get her own back.

A detailed forensic investigation by fire safety officers produced conclusive evidence that the fire had been started deliberately by Miss Williams.

The fire caused nearly £5,000 worth of damage and lost stock. However fire crews saved the premises thanks to prompt action.

2 TWO YOUTHS HELD AFTER BLAZE AT CYCLE SHOP

Two youths were arrested on suspicion of arson after fire swept through two floors of the Charnwood Cycles premises in the early hours of yesterday morning.

Three fire crews rushed to the scene to find the building well alight about 4.00am. This latest incident follows a recent break in at the shop in which a £2,500 cycle was stolen among other items.

Following the break in, extra security measures were installed and it is believed that when those involved in yesterday's incident could not break into the shop, they decided to set fire to it instead.

At least 50 cycles were damaged in the blaze, with some frames twisting and melting in the heat.

Two 15 year old boys were arrested yesterday afternoon and were detained for questioning.

ARSONISTS COST SCHOOL £60,000

Arsonists are being blamed for the fire at a Loughborough school, which caused £60,000 worth of damage as three classrooms were completely destroyed.

Police and Fire Investigation Officers were called to the scene after the blaze ripped through the temporary wooden classrooms.

A press officer told us "Clear glass was found underneath burnt out debris inside the classroom". This means it smashed before the fire was started. Textbooks, video resources and pupils exam work were all lost in the fire.
