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FIRESKILLS COURSE A SUCCESS, YET AGAIN

The most recent FireSkills programme at Coalville Fire and Rescue Station was funded by the Safer North West Leicestershire Partnership. It proved to be a huge success and was thoroughly enjoyed by everyone who took part, both the children and the instructors.

FireSkills, a team-based programme for young people aged 12-17 years old, focuses mainly on practical firefighting drills, but also educates young people through sessions based around first aid and fire safety.

Operational firefighters play an integral part in the programme, running drill yard sessions and acting as positive role models to all young people taking part. Evaluation of the course has shown that it has a positive effect on young people's self-esteem and confidence by helping to improve their communication skills.

The participants of the programme ended the course with a presentation ceremony where they got the chance to demonstrate the skills they had learnt and impress their families and friends.

Helene Sutliff, Children and Safeguarding at Leicestershire Fire and Rescue Service said: "We would like to thank the Community Safety Partnership of North West Leicestershire District Council for the funding which allowed us to put on this programme in Coalville."

About the Service

Leicestershire Fire and Rescue Service provides emergency response, prevention and protection services from 20 stations across Leicester, Leicestershire and Rutland. Its headquarters is based in Birstall, Leicester.

The Service's prevention, education, enforcement and inspection programmes have resulted in significant reductions in the number of incidents. In the last ten years, fire related incidents have reduced by 46 percent.

During 2015/16, the Service attended 666 road traffic collisions, of which 174 were extrications freeing 208 people trapped inside their vehicles and completed 5086 home fire safety checks, fitting almost 4481 smoke alarms. Staff organised or supported almost 1431 events aimed at promoting fire and road safety and arson prevention, whilst also visiting 332 schools to deliver fire and road safety education to pupils.

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
